

Regular Meeting Minutes April 18, 2023 – 9:30 a.m.

Mayor O'Cain opened the Regular Meeting and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor O'Cain asked if there was any public comment; there was one.

Mr. Dhom of 4150 Laurel Park Highway, spoke about his opposition on a new Town Hall. He asked Council to use the energy to increase road improvements and infrastructure, as well as increase compensation for all Staff. Mr. Dhom said this would make Laurel Park a great place to live and work.

APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Commissioner Banta moved to approve the agenda. Mayor O'Cain asked for discussion; there was none. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

Commissioner Bridges moved to approve the consent agenda as presented. Mayor O'Cain asked for discussion; there was none. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

NEW BUSINESS

HENDERSON COUNTY COMPREHENSIVE PLAN PRESENTATION

Autumn Radcliff and Christopher Todd gave an overview of the Comprehensive Plan submitted to the County Board of Commissioners.

Mayor Pro Tem Hansen asked Mr. Todd about the Ecusta Trail maintenance and what the County is planning.

Mr. Todd stated the County is still getting it all worked out. The County is hoping there is participation by all and continuity. Maintenance plans were sent to Staff which proposed three situations:

- a. Each entity/municipality would be responsible for the maintenance in their area;
- b. One entity would be responsible for the whole trail;
- c. Or it would be a hybrid responsibility.

ARTAC is in charge and a bid will go out for maintenance work.

Mayor Pro Tem Hansen said the Ecusta trail is a linear park. The residents of Laurel Park pay taxes to the County. This is a County project, and the County should maintain the park. If Laurel Park has to maintain it, it will cost the Town money to hire additional staff, which the Town does not have.

Commissioner Bridges asked about parking logistics.

Mr. Todd said funding sources can't pay for trail head sites for parking. The County is modeling the successful Swamp Rabbit Trail and hoping to have partnerships with religious groups and businesses.

Commissioner Banta said he will contact some churches and synagogues.

Mr. Todd and Ms. Radcliff departed the meeting at 10:13 a.m.

STORY MAP BUDGET AMENDMENT

Mayor Pro Tem Hansen said he met with Town Manager Carmichael and Commissioner Bridges and spoke about options. Some of those options were not really good. Town Council recommended delaying the Story May discussion until the next meeting when Commissioner Dunn was present.

GLENN ROCK SPRINGS BUDGET AMENDMENT

Town Manger Carmichael said Budget Amendment #6 appropriates \$1,565 from Fund Balance to Parks Contracted Services (10-6130-4450.) This appropriation is necessary to pay for services at Glenn Rock Springs. The deck work came in a little over.

Mayor O'Cain said Eagle Scout Tristan proposed to do the boardwalk at the swampy portion that would cost \$500. Mayor O'Cain asked if Staff would increase the Budget Amendment #6 by \$500 for the Eagle Scout work.

Mayor Pro Tem Hansen moved to approve amended Budget Amendment #6 with the addition of \$500 making the Budget Amendment \$2065. Mayor O'Cain asked for discussion; there was none. The vote was unanimous in favor of the motion.

f. Budget Amendment #6 - The aforesaid Amendment is attached to and made part of these minutes as Appendix 6.

Commissioner Banta asked staff to reiterate that the Parks and Greenways Board needs to work within their budget.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

Town Manager Carmichael stated Staff is working on the budget and the competition of priorities.

Mr. Carmichael and Mayor O'Cain will be meeting with Towerpointe this afternoon.

Mr. Carmichael congratulated Commissioner Bridges on being honored by the League of Municipalities for the most number of classes taken.

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

PUBLIC WORKS

Public Works Director Brandon Johnson said the department is continuing to work on culverts and patch work. Mr. Johnson said the department hopes to finish brush this week and start delivering mulch.

Commissioner Bridges asked Staff to put in the newsletter about contacting the City of Hendersonville for any water problems like busted water meters.

Council asked Staff to contact the City of Hendersonville to repair the road after tearing it up to fix a water leak.

POLICE

Chief Trotter said there were 13, 073 events, two were citations. There was a DWI check point on March 17 that is not included in this report. The department gave out 18 citations during that day.

The department will have an Inservice for the next 2 weeks. There will be another community class on Thursday, April 20.

ADMINISTRATION

Town Clerk Amin said the Town will be having many events coming up:

- 1st official Bee Committee Meeting today at 4:30
- Earth Day Clean up on Saturday, April 22 at Town Hall at 9 a.m.
- Volunteer Gardening Day at Laurel Green at 10 a.m.
- Arbor Day Tree Planting at Jump Off Rock at 10 a.m.

FIRE

Fire Chief Tim Garren was not present.

Commissioner Bridges said the ISO rating for Valley Hill came in at 2. Mayor Pro Tem Hansen asked Staff to get assessment.

MAYOR AND COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

<u>Commissioner Bridges</u> – Commissioner Bridges asked Staff to start scheduling neighborhood meetings.

Mayor O'Cain asked if Cedarbrook would come down. Commissioner Bridges said she will make it happen.

Commissioner Banta said previous Town Managers went to HOA meetings and gave 10-minute overviews of what is happening in Town.

Commissioner Banta recommended Town Manger and one or two Council members start attending.

Mayor O'Cain recommended waiting until the Town has a budget and then seeing what needs to be scheduled.

<u>Commissioner Banta</u> – Commissioner Banta said he attended the Ecusta Trail County Organization Meeting, and they are speeding up the discussion of amenities. He let the County know that Laurel Park does not want to burden the residents with financial obligations for the Ecusta Trail. The County should be responsible for it.

<u>Mayor O'Cain</u> – Mayor O'Cain asked Staff to get the status of Laurel Green. Town Manager Carmichael said he will follow up and get a start date.

Mayor Pro Tem Hansen – Mayor Pro Tem Hansen had no comments.

Commissioner Dunn – Commissioner Dunn was not present.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, Mayor Pro Tem Hansen moved to adjourn at 10:40 a.m. Mayor O'Cain asked for discussion; there was none. The motion carried unanimously.





Tax Collector's Report (March 31, 2023)-

For prior year taxes, a total of \$29,759.96 remains outstanding. The Town received \$5,623.52 from Henderson County for property taxes collected for August and a total of \$1,849,029.48 since the 2022 bills were mailed. The 2022 tax levy is \$1,867,476.50. The Town currently has a collection rate of 99.369%.

Appendix-5 Town of Laurel Park PROCLAMATION WORLD BEE DAY May 20, 2023

WHEREAS, most of the 25,000 to 30,000 species of bees (Hymenoptera: Apidae) are effective pollinators, and together with moths, flies, wasps, beetles, and butterflies, they make up the majority of pollinating species; and

WHEREAS, Pollination is a keystone process, critical for food production and human livelihoods, making bees and other pollinators critical to ensuring the global safety of the food supply chain. A third of all food produced in the world, i.e. every third spoon of food, depends on pollination; and

WHEREAS, bees also serve as sentinels for emergent environmental risks, signaling the health of local ecosystems. Without their service, many interconnected species and processes functioning within the ecosystem would collapse; and

WHEREAS, Beyond food, pollinators also contribute directly to medicines, biofuels, fibers like cotton and linen, and construction materials; and

WHEREAS. Studies of United Nations and the International Union for Conservation of Nature show that bee populations have significantly decreased, due to numerous factors including intensive agriculture, widespread use of pesticides and pollution caused by waste, loss of habitat, exposure to new diseases and pests; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Laurel Park manages parks, public landscaping, and other public lands that may include greenways and wildlife habitats; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Laurel Park of Henderson County, North Carolina, USA, provides recommendations to developers and residents regarding landscaping to promote wise conservation stewardship, including the protection of pollinators and maintenance of their habitats; and

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. Carey O'Cain, Mayor of the Town of Laurel Park, do hereby proclaim the May 20, 2023, as our municipality's observance of

World Bee Day

And, as Laurel Park is an affiliate of **Bee City USA®**, do urge all citizens to recognize this observance.
